Ohio School Boards Association President says systemic racism does not exist: He did. <u>I</u> swear.

House Bill 73: Introduced by Reps Gayle Manning (R) and Erica Crawley (D) this latest iteration of the Testing Reduction Act will eliminate 3rd grade retention, make the ACT/SAT optional, combine the American History & Government assessments, and require districts to audit their own levels of assessment. It will have its first hearing in the Education Committee on Wednesday, May 12.

Budget Bill: The Ohio House <u>passed its version of the Budget Bill</u> in April, furthering a customarily lengthy process. The bill includes the Fair School Funding Plan that has <u>the OEA</u> and educators statewide excited. There is still a long way to go before the bill is completed, and items included now may not travel the distance, while others may be added. Contact your legislators in the Ohio <u>House</u> and <u>Senate</u> to advocate for Constitutional (and equitable) school funding.

House Bill 99: If you ever dreamed of teaching class while wearing a sidearm, this bill is for you. If that possibility scares the hell out of you, then you might want to contact a legislator. HB 99 would dramatically <u>reduce the amount of training necessary</u> to carry a firearm in school. It is currently being debated in the House.
