Meet the New Boss, Same as the Old Boss? The decision on a new State Superintendent is being made by the State Board of Education at its March meeting. Will the new boss smile and nod along in mock empathetic consideration, and do what his political handlers demand like the last guy? Or will the new Super just skip the pretense and make the awful decisions outright like the guy before that? House Bill 327 is frightening. Under the bill, Ohio teachers can be punished for "failing to fairly present both sides" of a political position. Both sides of the Holocaust? Japanese Internment? Slavery? A woman's right to vote? Check out the full bill here. Look for Section 3319.614.

Cool, now that you're as incensed as I am, get on the horn to the <u>Ohio House of</u>
<u>Representatives</u>. This bill is awaiting a committee hearing for a vote, and being taken seriously by some members of the General Assembly.

It is worth noting that the <u>College Board has indicated</u> that courses in Ohio may not be able offer Advanced Placement courses for college credit if this bill is passed.

On Wednesday March 9th the group <u>Honesty for Ohio Education</u> held a <u>rally in Columbus</u> in opposition to the legislation.
