DeWine Vetoes the SAFE Act: Governor DeWine's veto of HB68, which would have banned gender-affirming medical care for minors & banned transgender athletes from participation in women's sports, has prompted outrage in his own party. OEA were firm opponents of the bill, as were medical experts and children's hospitals statewide. Republican leaders were immediately assessing the likelihood of raising the \(^3\s_6\)majority vote necessary to override the veto. The override could move forward in the House as early as January 10th. Lawsuits will follow.

Senate Bill 83: This <u>attack on higher education</u> is still being held at bay by a lack of a vote in the full Ohio House of Representatives, despite having passed out of committee. It is worth keeping your eyes open as the General Assembly reconvenes this week.
