Title IX: Biden administration clarifies Title IX rules to prevent discrimination against LGBTQ+ students. Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost sues the Biden administration to assure the right to discriminate against LGBTQ+ students. I hate it here sometimes. Ohio Senate pretends to do something about student cell phones while doing nothing about student cell phones (or guns or poverty or anything else for that matter): "The legislation does not require schools to adopt a ban on all student cellphone issues, but that is an option if the school district chooses to do so," <u>Senator Andrew Brenner said</u>. "It requires district cellphone policy to emphasize minimal use and least amount of distraction caused by cellphones during school hours. Districts that have a policy meeting these restrictions need not adopt a new policy."

Having passed the Senate in late April, amended <u>House Bill 250 passed the House on May 8</u> and now awaits the Governor's signature. The bill also changes the Military Enlistment Seal for Graduation and expands allowances for grade band changes in teacher certification. OEA wrote about the bill in their <u>May 1st Legislative Watch</u>.

"Don't Say Gay": <u>Ohio shapes HB8, its "Don't Say Gay" Bill, to look more like Florida's</u> as it continues to move through the General Assembly. Critics argue that the bill will put already marginalized students in danger. The Center for Christian Virtue appears to be the only organization to have testified recently in support of the bill.
