## **EEA Legislative Report January 2025**

Welcome back! With the exception of having to go outdoors in the cold of January & not having the freedom to pee when nature calls, I trust that your return to teaching has gone swimmingly.

**The Good News:** On Sunday January 5th <u>President Biden signed the Social Security Fairness</u> <u>Act</u>, a bill long supported by NEA. The legislation eliminates provisions that limit Social Security payments for individuals who receive retirement payments from other sources.

**\$4 Million More for Vouchers:** The Ohio Legislature has shifted some more tax dollars into the budget of the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce (that's DEW to me and you) for its <u>ongoing defense in the lawsuit contending that Ohio's voucher scheme is unconstitutional</u>. If it helps you sleep, an additional \$4 million in our tax dollars is a drop in the bucket compared to the \$1 billion the state already spent on vouchers to pay for rich kids to go to private school.

**Trump 2.0:** Just what will a second Trump presidency mean for education in Ohio? Less regulation? A war on intellectualism? The death of the federal Department of Education? Funding cuts for economically disadvantaged schools? More support for school choice? Increased attacks on marginalized kids?

**Forced-outing bill:** Governor Mike <u>DeWine signed a bill</u> to require school districts adopt policies related to religious release times, as well as require school personnel to out a student's sexuality to parents.

**Public School Funding Cuts:** Having spent roughly \$1 billion to send wealthy kids to private schools, Ohio Republican House Speaker Matt Huffman has threatened to <u>cut funding to public schools</u>. He calls the fair school funding formula, which has yet to be fully funded, unsustainable. In response to Huffman's threats, legislators on both sides of the aisle <u>have vowed to protect public schools.</u>
